<p>Copyrights do not last forever. When a copyright expires, according to the laws of the country which governs the right, the previously protected work becomes freely available with no restrictions on its use. Some materials are always in the public domain because their producers decide to make them freely available, without restrictions. <i>Examples are pictures and videos produced by U.S. government employees (who are acting within the scope of their government work) and Wikimedia-Commons images (whose producers have released their work into the public domain).</i></p>	<p>Copyright holders may allow their protected work to be licensed by others. The licenses can be free or paid. Creative Commons, for example, is a licensing system which allows the free use of copyrighted materials provided that all requirements of the license selected by the copyright holder are followed. Many images and video clips available online have Creative-Commons licenses.</p>	<p>The law allows “fair use” of copyrighted materials. Reviewers and critics of new books and movies, for example, quote passages or show clips which promote the copyrighted works to the public. Similarly, the limited use of copyright-protected materials for educational purposes is permitted, particularly when the user provides context for, or amplification of, the copyrighted excerpts. When claiming fair use for educational or promotional purposes, the user must give full attribution to the author and the copyrighted work.</p>	<p>People who create music, books, movies, art and other such productions spend a lot of time and money on their work. All rights to copy or use those productions, in any way, belong to the creators or to their designees. Anyone wishing to use the copyrighted material must get permission before using it. Restrictions against the use of copyright-protected material are full and complete, but there are limited exceptions for “fair use.”</p>
