

# CHICAGO IN 1871



How did Chicago appear in 1871, before the Great Fire burned several miles of America's "Second City?" The summer of 1871 was dry. About one inch of rain had fallen in 4 months.

On October 8th, a large city on the shore of Lake Michigan was about to endure one of the <u>worst</u> urban fires in American history. Maximizing tinder-dry conditions, a gale-force wind turned a small fire into a huge disaster. Almost three square miles of the city were destroyed. Nearly 300 people died. The entire <u>business section</u> was wiped out.

Chicago had come a long way since Jean-Baptiste Pointe DuSable first settled near Lake Michigan (in the late 18th century) and John Kinzie built his home there (in 1815). From a small settlement (not far from Fort Dearborn) to a major transportation center (40 years later), Chicago prospered.

As the Civil War neared its end, <u>Chicago</u> was "the metropolis of the northwest." <u>By 1868</u>, little was stopping the city's growth.

The three branches of the Chicago River formed a kind of boundary for the town (as demonstrated by an <u>1871</u> <u>Harper's Weekly drawing</u>). The south branch (left side of the picture) divided the rural part of south Chicago (where the O'Leary family lived) from the urban part.

In 1871, Chicago had over 330,000 inhabitants. Its fire department and <u>equipment</u> were "modern" for the time, but the city employed only 185 fire-fighting personnel.

On the night of October 7th, a <u>mill plant fire</u> broke out at what is now <u>209 South Canal Street</u>. Some of the city's equipment was damaged while firemen were battling that blaze.

Worse, the fire at Lull & Holmes Planing Mill overtaxed an already overworked, understaffed fire-fighting crew.

#### Do Consecutive Disasters Sap Our Strength and Morale?


The day before the Great Fire of 1871 consumed a significant part of Chicago's business district, the city's

firefighters fought a devastating mill fire on October 7, 1871. It occurred at Lull and Holmes, on Canal Street, where Union Station sits today.

What impact may that mill fire have had on firefighters' ability to battle the catastrophe which followed 24 hours later?

Do consecutive disasters, like both of those fires, have a tendency to sap our strength and morale? Why, or why not?
