Fighting in Vietnam's civil war intensified as America aided the South. These pictures, from various U.S. archives, help us to glimpse the impact:

- A Marine <u>flame thrower</u> tank in action near Da Nang.
- In March, 1966, the Viet Cong attacked a South Vietnamese village with particular ferocity. The U.S. Air Force airlifts <u>villagers</u> to a safe area near Saigon.
- The *USS Enterprise* <u>cruising in the Gulf of Tonkin</u>. (Decades later, <u>the ship</u> was the subject of a major scandal involving its Commander, <u>Captain Owen Honors</u>.)
- Troops from "A" company, 1st Air Cavalry, on "house patrol," check for North Vietnamese saboteurs.
- Marines take a rest and bathe in a stream.
- Soldiers take a break and drink coconut milk during the search and seizure phase of "Operation Pershing."
- While a Marine sentry stands guard, his comrades celebrate an outdoor Mass.
- A familiar sight during the war: <u>Treating a wounded man</u> injured by an exploding white-phosphorus booby trap.
- The President and General Westmoreland visit troops at Cam Ranh Bay.

By Christmas of 1967, when the President once-again visited the troops, something was in the works which he and his generals did not know. North Vietnam was planning a <u>massive invasion</u> of the South to coincide with "Tet" (the Vietnamese New Year).

Called the "<u>Tet Offensive</u>," it was responsible for huge losses in the South and major draft increases in America. Most people believe it was the turning point of the Vietnam War.

Tet's terror was widespread. With little doubt, the worst events took place in the ancient city of Hue where the Viet Cong massacred thousands of people.

#### USS Enterprise - Captain Owen Honors

The aircraft carrier USS Enterprise (CVN 65) underway in the Atlantic Ocean. Enterprise is one of seven aircraft carriers involved in <u>Summer Pulse 2004</u>. Summer Pulse 2004 is the simultaneous deployment of seven aircraft carrier strike groups (CSGs), demonstrating the ability of the Navy to provide credible combat power across the globe, in five theaters with other U.S., allied, and coalition military forces. Summer Pulse is the Navy's first deployment under its new Fleet Response Plan (FRP). The strike group will conduct a scheduled training exercise followed by overseas Pulse operations.


