LEOPOLD MAKES A MISTAKE



The Franks family, devastated by Bobby's murder, laid him to rest soon after his body was discovered at the Wolf Creek Culvert. At the time this picture was taken, no one knew that a teenager who lived across the street from the Franks had killed 14-year-old Bobby. Unknown to Leopold, only four people in the Chicago area had a prescription for his type of lenses. Because Leopold rarely wore those glasses, he didn't realize they were in his jacket when he and Loeb killed Bobby Franks. And ... he didn't realize they were missing.

Poor Nathan. His life was about to get jammed with lots of unwanted surprises.

In the meantime, even though Leopold and Loeb thought that no one knew Bobby was dead, investigative reporters from *The Chicago Daily News* were on to something. They knew about both the Chicago kidnapping and the Indiana unidentified body. They started to put <u>the evidence</u> together.

Leopold and Loeb had no idea their plan was already off track.

Expecting Mr. Franks to show up with the ransom money, the murderers were surprised when he didn't come. Leopold and Loeb soon learned why he had ignored their instructions. The headlines of *The Chicago Daily News* screamed at them.

Their plan had gone awry. The body that would never be found turned up. The hydrochloric acid had not done its job. Jacob and Flora knew their son was dead.


