
ARTISTIC INFLUENCES



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Beatrix Potter was influenced by Randolph Caldecott (in whose honor an <u>annual medal</u> is awarded to the artist who has created the "the most distinguished American picture book for children"). This Caldecott illustration, online via Project Gutenberg, is for the book "A Frog He Would a-Wooing Go" (published by Frederick Warne & Co. sometime between 1876 and 1879).

From an early age, Beatrix liked to draw. Because of her father's interest in photography, she met artists like <u>John Everett Millais</u>, whom Rupert <u>photographed</u> (on the left) at the Potter's rented summer home, Dalguise, in 1879. (John Bright, the famous orator and member of Parliament, is with him.)

Millais - according to <u>Beatrix's journal</u> - encouraged her, frequently complimenting her "keen observations." (*Beatrix Potter Journal*, page 460.) How meaningful such comments, from a <u>well-known artist</u>, must have been!

Beatrix said she was also influenced by <u>Randolph Caldecott</u>, whose <u>amazing illustrations</u> were published by Frederick Warne & Company (and whose <u>work is available</u>, on-line, thanks to Project Gutenberg). It is interesting to examine some of <u>Caldecott's drawings</u> in light of Beatrix's later books. From <u>A Frog He Would a-Wooing Go</u>:

- "Whether his Mother would let him or no."
- "Pray, Mr. FROG, will you give us a song?"
- "A Cat and her Kittens came tumbling in."
- "The Kittens they pulled the little Mouse down."
- "But as Froggy was crossing a silvery brook"
- "A lily-white Duck came and gobbled him up."

Although Caldecott also <u>included people</u> in his drawings, Beatrix thought she was never good at that. Her illustrations were <u>based on nature</u>, as Linda Lear discusses in <u>Beatrix Potter</u>, <u>A Life in Nature</u>.

What made Beatrix Potter a painter of nature? How did she approach her subject matter? Was she influenced by any naturalists who encouraged her work?

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

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


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
