THE PLOT THICKENS



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In this image from a red-figure Athenian vase, created around 500 BC, we see Achilles bandaging his close friend and relative, Patroclos, who had been wounded (by an arrow) in battle. The original artifact, made by Sosias, is now maintained by the Altes Museum in Berlin. Scholars are unsure of the illustrator. It could be Sosias Painter, the Kleophrades Painter or Euthymides. Compelled by an oracle to give up HIS war prize (a woman named Chryseis), Agammenon - as King - had the power to <u>take Briseis</u> from Achilles. He did precisely that. Reacting badly to this interference in his life, a sulking Achilles refused to fight against the Trojans.

Knowing the Greeks could not win without the help of their greatest <u>warrior</u>, Agamemnon tried to convince Achilles to set aside their personal differences. Achilles refused, although he reluctantly allowed <u>Patroclus</u> (wearing the armor of his cousin) to fight in his place.

Patroclus, however, was inexperienced and unable to defend himself against Hector, leader of the Trojan forces. The following day—initially believing that the man wearing Achilles' armor was, indeed, Achilles—Hector <u>killed Patroclus</u> and kept the armor for himself.

Achilles, both enraged and <u>grief-stricken</u> over the loss of his friend, agreed to actively engage the Trojans—especially Hector. Before that encounter took place, however, Agamemnon <u>returned Briseis</u>, untouched and unharmed, to Achilles.
