



During America's Great Depression, migrant farm workers who moved from place to place, following the harvests of various crops, lived in shelters which were frequently cluttered and/or unsanitary.

When Russell Lee (1903-1986) took this picture, in September of 1937, he was working for the federal government's Resettlement Administration (later known as the Farm Security Administration). The Library of Congress, which maintains the original negative, provides this <u>image description</u>:
